



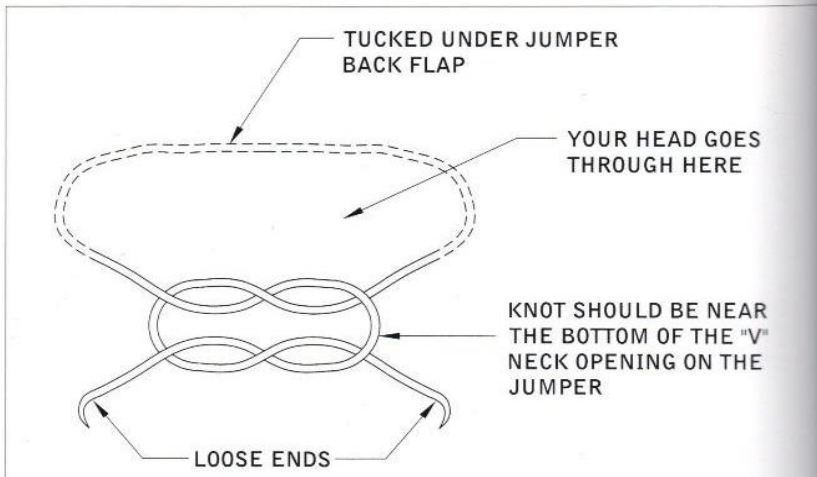
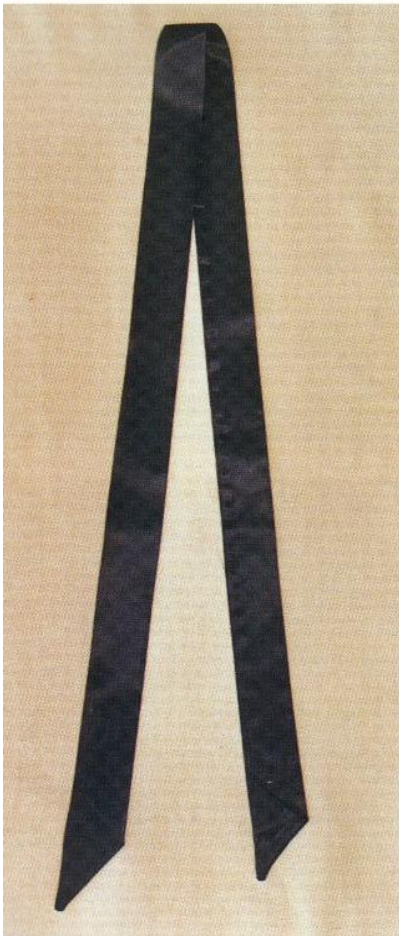
TOP LEFT: Neckerchiefs were to be square and made of black silk or rayon. These were always worn around the collar of dress blue and dress white jumper uniforms and when prescribed for undress jumper uniforms. (J. Warner)

ABOVE: Detail of this black silk neckerchief shows a series of four lines running along the outer edges. This is typical of World War II era neckerchiefs. (J. Warner)

LEFT: Beginning in approximately 1943, "conservation" neckerchiefs were made. As can be seen here, these made use of considerably less material and more closely resembled a traditional necktie. (J. Warner)

RIGHT: Neckerchiefs were to be tied into a square knot as shown and worn loose around the neck. (J. Warner)

BELOW: Instructions for properly tying the neckerchief into a square knot. (J. Warner)



The Neckerchief



1. Place neckerchief around the neck (under the collar) with right end four fingers longer than left end.
2. Cross the long end over the short end at the shirt "V"

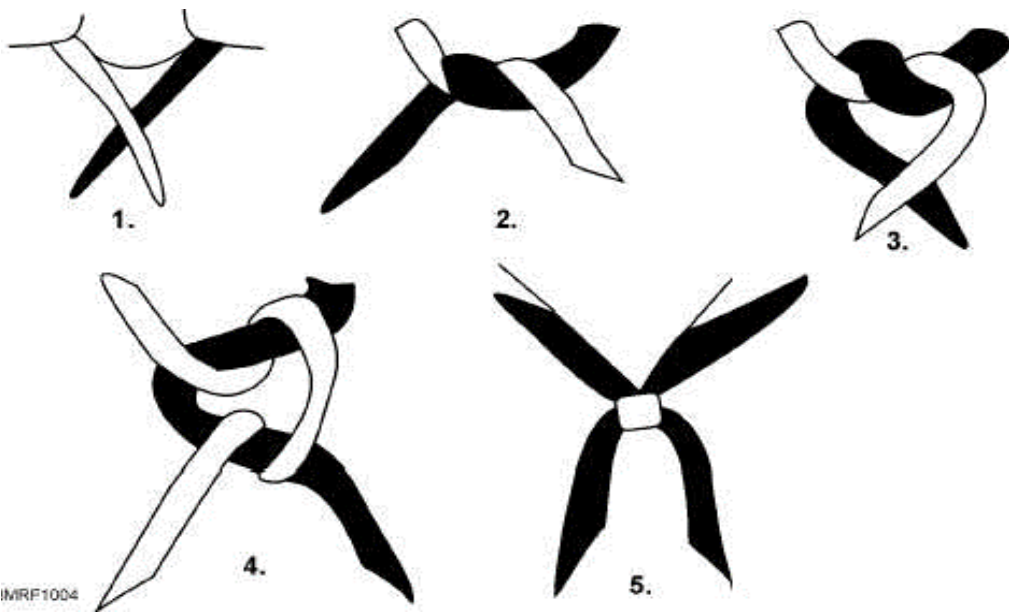


3. Draw the long end back, up over and down to the left.
4. Cross the long end over the short.



5. Bring the long end back thru the formed loop.
6. Shape the knot as shown. The top of the knot is even with the bottom of the "V" and the ends are the same length. The open end of the "V", behind the knot, is worn to the left of the wearer.
